Park Enhancement Fund

This year we received a grant from the park enhancement fund! This allowed us to expand our interpretive programs at Furlong Bay Campground! In addition to our regular interpretive walks we held 5 additional educational events:

- *
 - 1. All About the Birds with local biologist Frank Doyle
 - 2. Save the Bees
 - 3. Beach Seine with DFO
 - 4. The Skeena Watershed with SkeenaWild
 - 5. Clean, Drain, Dry Invasive Species

Due to COVID-19 we only allowed 8 people at each event, sometimes hosting two groups per event. A sign-up sheet was used to ensure that only eight people would attend. Hand sanitizer was provided, and surfaces were disinfected regularly.



Event 1: All About the Birds

Local biologist Frank Doyle joined us on a walk as he told about birds found in the Lakelse Lake park. Several different calls were performed to attract birds along the trail. The northern water thrush, red headed sap sucker, swainsons thrush, and a king fisher were all spotted along the walk. Participants enjoyed learning about nature and the birds surrounding it





Event 2: Save the Bees!



We had a great turnout to our event!

Activities included building a bee bath and planting wildflowers in a pot. Presenters talked about pollinator species, wildflowers, and bees. Informational pamphlets with facts about bees were given out to group members.







Event 3: Beach Seine with DFO!

Rob Dams, the Department of Fisheries Community Adviser, joined us at Furlong Bay Campground to conduct a beach seine! We caught peamouth chub, three-spine stickelback and sculpin in our net! The fish were then displayed in a viewing tank in order to get a close up view!




Event 4: The Skeena Watershed with SkeenaWild

SkeenaWild is a local, non-profit organization that works to educate others on the importance of our local ecosystems and the salmon within them. Christine Slanz, a member of Skeena Wild Conservation Trust, hosted an amazing event with us!



Using model watersheds and different smelling substances, Christine demonstrated how pollution gets transferred throughout a watershed and how salmon use their scent to find their way back to the stream where they were born.





Event 5: Clean, Drain, Dry – Invasive Species!

We hosted an informational session regarding invasive species and how to prevent there introduction into our ecosystems!

We discussed our clean, drain, dry initiative, and organized some fun and educational activities!


